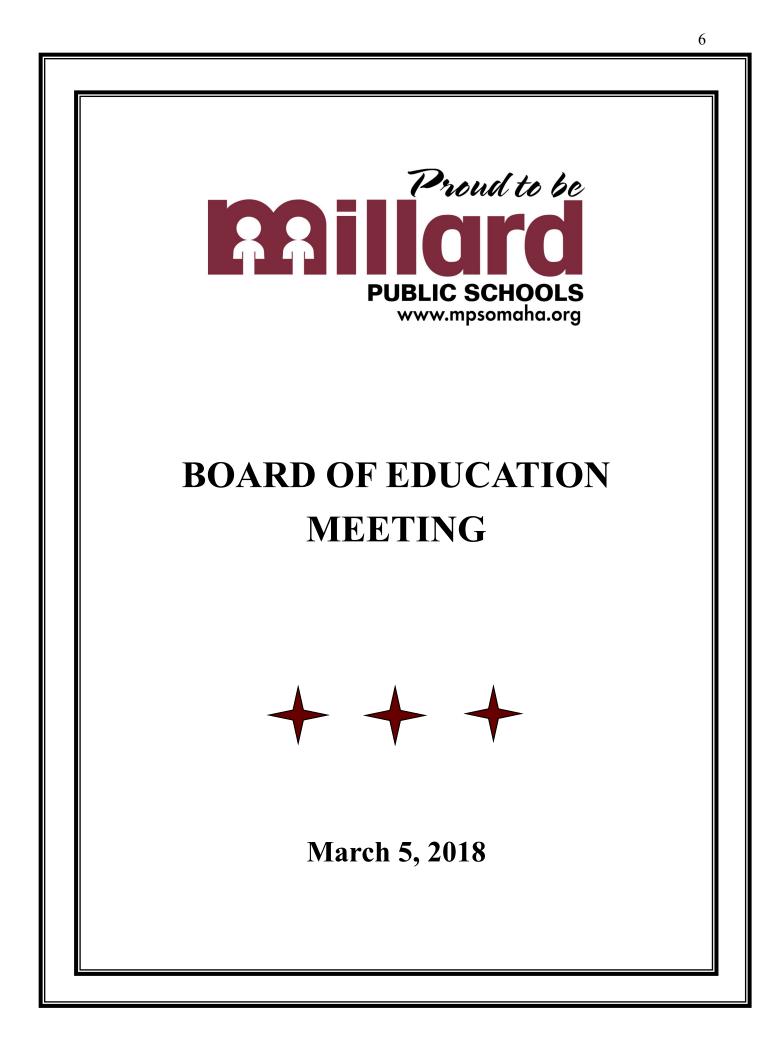

#### **Board Comments:**

#### Mike Kennedy:

Mr. Kennedy attended the National Legislative Conference in Washington D.C. and was unable to be at the last Board meeting. He shared that he had good discussion with our congressional leaders regarding school funding and where education is going at the national level. It was a very well attended conference and our local congressional leaders were attentive to hearing from us about what is going on in our districts and what they can do to help us.

Since Mr. Kennedy was not in attendance at the last Board meeting, he stated he wanted to go on record that he is in full support of the vote taken by the Board regarding the changes made at the middle schools with the curriculum and longer periods in the day. He said valid points were made by both parties on the issue. Improving our tests scores and students having extra time is very important to take care of our mission which is to produce quality results with our children.

Mr. Kennedy said he sees some troubling trends in the budget. Already it looks like our state aid will go down \$2,000,000.00 next year and one district will receive a \$14,000,000.00 increase. Our community needs to be aware of this. We promised we would not use the full nine cents when the levy override passed. Even if we did, it wouldn't be enough. Mr. Kennedy said this is a state funding formula problem. He told Dr. Sutfin if there is anything we can do, our efforts need to go towards changing the TEEOSA formula.

#### Linda Poole:

Mrs. Poole said she spent last Monday and Tuesday at the TAC meeting in Lincoln and provided feedback from that meeting to Dr. Phipps and Dr. Kelberlau. The committee will have a conference call after the NSCAS test is given this spring. Then, the next meeting will be in October.

Mrs. Poole expressed her condolences, thoughts and prayers to the Parkland, Florida school district for the tragedy they just experienced. She wants them to know that people all across the country are thinking about them.

#### Amanda McGill Johnson:

Mrs. McGill Johnson said she will not be in attendance at the meeting on March 12 and will not be one of the Board members that needs to be to the meeting early.

#### Mike Pate:

Mr. Pate's MABE group met last week. Several school districts were in attendance. Mr. Pate high-lighted the important happenings going on at some of the school districts. He said he also mentioned to the group, the #BeKind initiative that our district will be a part of. Dr. Sutfin added that all school districts in the ESU#3 area as well as in the Learning Community have signed on. He said the next big thing we have will take place this Thursday, February 22. Three students from each of the area schools will be meeting at ESU#3 for half a day of planning what the #BeKind initiative could look like from a student's perspective. #### **Reports:**

#### Elementary Learning Center summer Program Report:

Mr. Andy DeFreece presented this report. He shared this program is paid for by Learning Community funds. We had over 250 students who participated in the program which is designed to help provide extra practice in reading, writing and math. Fifty percent of the students are free & reduced price lunch and about 20% receive ELL services. Mr. DeFreece said they have consistently shown that students who participate have less summer retention loss then those students who do not participate. It doesn't completely make up for summer loss, but it certainly helps. Mr. DeFreece thanked Dr. Kara Hutton for her work with special programs and summer programs.

Dr. Phipps shared information regarding Senator Linehan's bill and the amendment that was added and brought forward this year. One of the items in the bill and the amendment is to offer the opportunity to students for a summer reading program if they are determined to be below proficient in reading. With the amendment in its' current state, we would be required to offer free of charge, 60 hours of summer reading camp for students that are below proficient in reading. We do receive state aid for summer school, but if you are an unequalized school, there is no money for this mandate. Districts would have to offer this free of charge. Mr. Nolan Beyer added that most districts are standing down from this amendment.

### Legislative Update:

Mr. Nolan Beyer said today was day 29 of the 60 day session. Tomorrow we will know the priority bills as they need to be named by Senators and committees. On Wednesday, the speaker will announce his 25 priority bills. Mr. Beyer added it will be very difficult for a bill to reach the floor with only 31 more days remaining, if it does not have a priority attached to it. The speaker is committed to getting every priority bill at least to the first reading.

Mr. Beyer shared that the education committee has been somewhat inactive.

Mr. Pate reminded the Board of future agenda items and said this is the proper time for public questions and comments. There were no requests to speak.

Mrs. Poole reminded the Board that she would not be in attendance at the March 5, 2018 meeting. She has conferences at her school that evening.

At 7:56 p.m. Mike Kennedy make a motion to go into Executive Session, seconded by Linda Poole. Voting in favor of said motion was: Mr. Anderson, Mrs. McGill Johnson, Mr. Pate, Mrs. Poole, and Mr. Kennedy. Voting against was: None. Motion carried.

Motion by Linda Poole and seconded by Mike Kennedy to come out of Executive Session at 8:15 p.m. Voting in favor of said motion was: Mr. Kennedy, Mrs. Poole, Mr. Anderson, Mrs. McGill Johnson, and Mr. Pate. Voting against was: None. Motion carried.

At 8:20 p.m. Mr. Pate stated he was going to reconvene the meeting of the Board of Education to discuss the candidate interviews and said each Board member would make final comments before the vote.

Mr. Pate said that five excellent candidates applied for this position and added that this public office is not an easy job. For someone to step forward for this position is admirable. #### Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment

#### Taught Curriculum - Make-Up Work

Make-up Work for Excused and Unexcused Absences.

The teacher of each grade or subject area will determine the plans for making up the work subject to the following considerations.

- 1. Schoolwork missed due to an excused or unexcused absence, must be completed to the satisfaction of each teacher whose class was missed.
- 2. Students will have a minimum of one (1) school day for each day of absence, to make up missed schoolwork. Students who do not make up their work within the prescribed time limits will not receive credit for the work missed.
- 3. Make-up work may be provided prior to a planned absence if the lessons and assignments have already been planned for and prepared by the teacher in the context of having created the weekly lesson plans. Make-up work provided to a student in advance of their absence does not guarantee that no additional work may need to be completed upon their return to school. Students who do not request missed work in advance will be provided all assigned work when the student returns from an absence.
- 4. Providing early or late semester exams is at the discretion of the building principal or the principal's designee.

During prolonged absence due to illness, the parent may call the school office to make arrangements for picking up the missed work.

When the school administration has given approval for a student to participate in school sponsored programs such as High Ability Learners (HAL) Seminars, music programs, dramatics, or athletics, the student should not be penalized for not being present to take tests and participate in the daily work. The student shall be given an opportunity to make up any work missed.

### **Key Findings**

I. Question One (page 3)

#### A. How has poverty changed over time within the district? Within the State?

- Both NE and MPS poverty rates have increased similarly over time.
- Current rates are 45% and 21%, respectively.
- II. Question Two (pages 4-5)

#### A. What has the district done financially to remediate the effects of poverty?

MPS financial support toward the instructional needs for Students of Poverty has exceeded the State Statutory Requirement of 117.65%. In 2016-2017, the designated state aid for poverty was \$950,628, and the MPS General Fund provided an additional \$902,705. for poverty for a total of \$1,863,333.

#### III. Question Three (pages 5-10)

# A. How has academic achievement for students in poverty changed over time? Is the academic rate of growth for students in poverty similar to the District rate of growth?

- Literacy Results -- Poverty students achieved at a lower level when compared to the "all students" group for NE and MPS. Those differences were similar for NE and MPS. MPS groups of students (all and poverty) outperformed the comparable state group at all grade levels.
- Mathematics Results -- Poverty students achieved at a lower level when compared to the "all students" group for NE and MPS. Those differences were similar for NE and MPS. MPS groups of students (all and poverty) outperformed the comparable state group at almost all grade levels. NE poverty students at grades 6 and 8 had a higher percentage of students than MPS students that met / exceeding state expectations. Also, at 6th grade the state group of poverty students had a higher average scale score than did MPS poverty students.
- High School Results -- there are differences between the two student groups at MPS and NE across the three reported areas of English Language Arts, Mathematics, and Science. Those differences are similar in MPS and in NE.

#### **Background:**

Poverty in Nebraska experienced an increase from the 2002-03 school year up through 2013-14 school year and has since leveled off through the 2016-17 school year. The most noticeable increases for Millard Public Schools (MPS) were from 2008-09 to 2009-10 and 2015-16 to 2016-17. However, one should note these increases were both 3% but total district enrollments were different between the two time periods. The 2008-09 school year was the implementation year for MPS's first Poverty Plan as required by the Nebraska Department of Education (NDE) to receive funding for activities included within the plan. The 2008-09 application was completed in November, 2007. The State Poverty Plan requirements include an evaluation component. MPS Poverty Plans include updated summary information about the criteria of the plan.

In accordance with District Strategic Plan (2013) Strategy 2: We will develop and implement plans utilizing instructional best practice, formative an summative assessments and student data designed to ensure that all students are college and career ready, Action Plan 5 Specific Result: Examine demographic trends and develop strategies to address the unique needs of each student. and Action Steps 1-5 the district was charged with examining demographic trends, developing strategies and allocating resources to meet the unique needs of each student. The District Poverty Plan is one area to focus that attention.

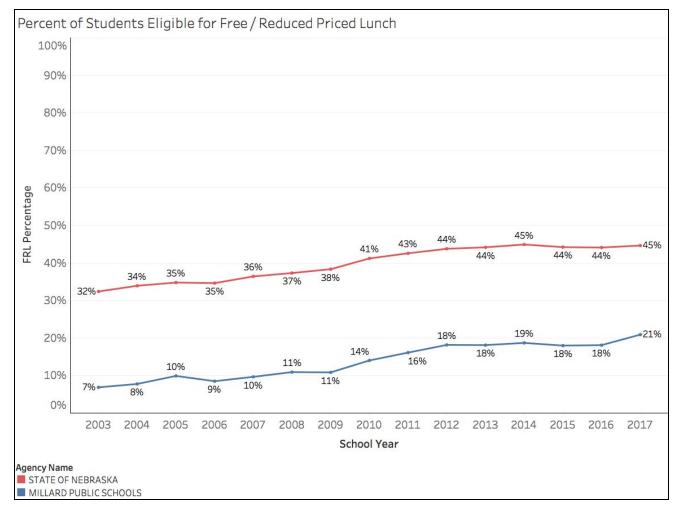

# **Evaluation Question One:**

## How has poverty changed over time within the district? Within the state?

The following information is taken from data collected by the Nebraska Department of Education and displayed on the Nebraska Educational Profile (NEP) website. The two lines in the graph below show the percent of students (for MPS and the State) who do have FRL classification. The MPS Poverty Rate (bottom line) has been lower than the Poverty Rate for students in all Nebraska (top line) schools throughout the years as reported by the Nebraska Department of Education (2002-03 through 2016-17).

Since the 2002-03 school year, the State level of poverty has increased from 32% to 45%. The MPS level of poverty has increased from 7% to 21% in that same time period. Both rates for MPS and NE have leveled off the past six years. However, MPS did experience a slight spike (3%) from 2015-16 to 2016-17.

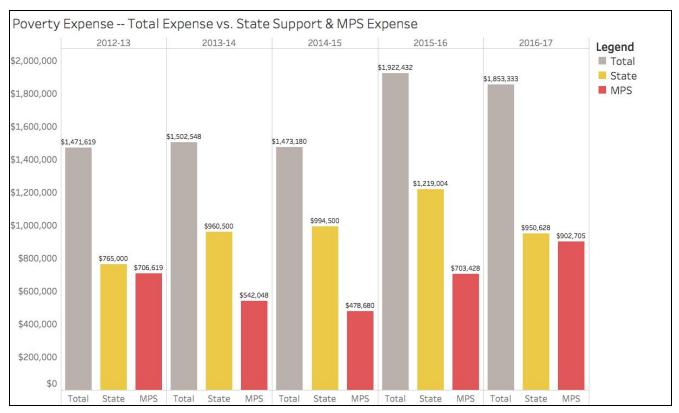


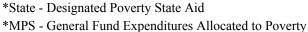
## **Evaluation Question Two:**

### What has the district done financially to remediate the effects of poverty?

- a. What has been committed to this work?
- b. Proportionally, what has been the district's financial effort over time?

The following financial data is taken from Millard Public Schools budget records and displays the total expenses used to support instructional needs for students of poverty against financial support by Nebraska and MPS.





In Nebraska, pursuant to Nebraska State Statute § 79-1007.07 (3) in accordance with the Federal No Child Left Behind Act-Title I Program, the requirement has been set for schools to support their district plans with 117.65% of the state funds. These funds are intended for the additional instructional needs of students in poverty. The following table details the distribution of these funds from the MPS General Fund over the past five years.

In Millard Public Schools, a 3% increase of Poverty (FRL) from 2012-13 (18%) to 2016-17 (21%) has been supported by a \$337,270 (31%) increase in funding during that time. In 2016-17 revenue directed to instructional needs of students of poverty was 194.95% of Designated Poverty State Aid. This exceeds the State requirement of 117.65% of Designated Poverty State Aid.

# **Evaluation Question Three:**

# How has student achievement for students in poverty changed over time? Is the academic rate of growth for students in poverty similar to the District rate of growth?

In the charts to follow, explanation of grouping differences throughout -- if data were obtained from the NDE website (NEP) the student groups are "All Students" and "Students Eligible for Free / Reduced Priced Lunch". If data were obtained locally the group comparison is between Poverty vs. Non-Poverty.

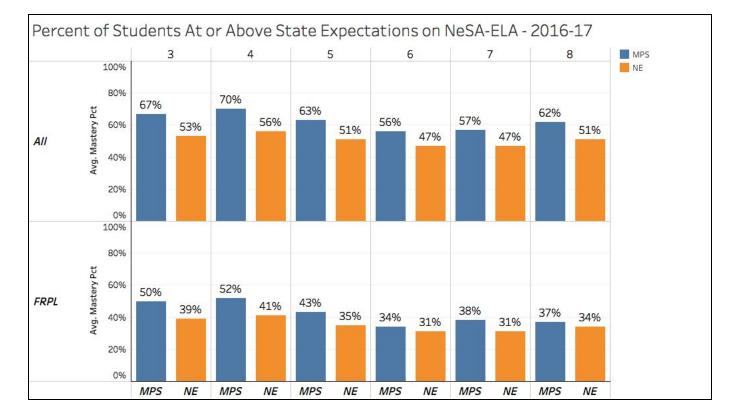
# LITERACY Results

## NeSA - English Language Arts (ELA) -- 3rd - 8th Grades

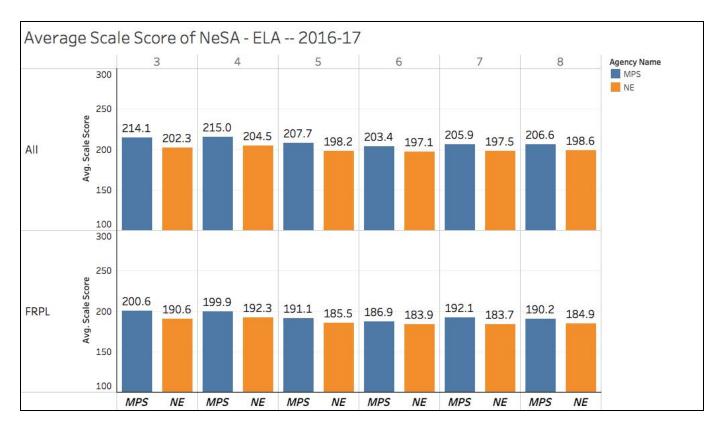
The NeSA-ELA assesses our state college and career readiness standards on reading vocabulary, reading comprehension, and writing skills. This is a broad look at student achievement in the area of English Language Arts or Literacy. The state test is administered in grades 3 - 8. For 2016-17, a significant difference between grades 3 and 4 versus 5 through 8 is that the older students have a text-dependent analysis (TDA) item to complete. This is a performance task in which students read a passage and then generate an essay answering the provided prompt. The state expectations for this was set high. The following data provide a relative comparison for all students and students of poverty between MPS and NE. The data were obtained from the NEP website.

The top row of the chart below displays the percent of all students (MPS and Nebraska) at or above state ELA expectations. The lower row shows achievement levels of students in poverty for MPS, as compared to Nebraska. A few noteworthy points on the 3-8 graph:

- All students -- MPS achievement levels were above their respective NE group.
- Poverty Students -- MPS achievement levels were above their respective NE group.
- Poverty students achieved at a lower level as compared to the all student group for MPS and NE.



The next chart compares the same groups of students but uses average scale score as the metric. The scale score ranges from 100 to 300. The state expectation cut score is 200 for all grade levels. The interpretation from this chart is very similar to the chart above.



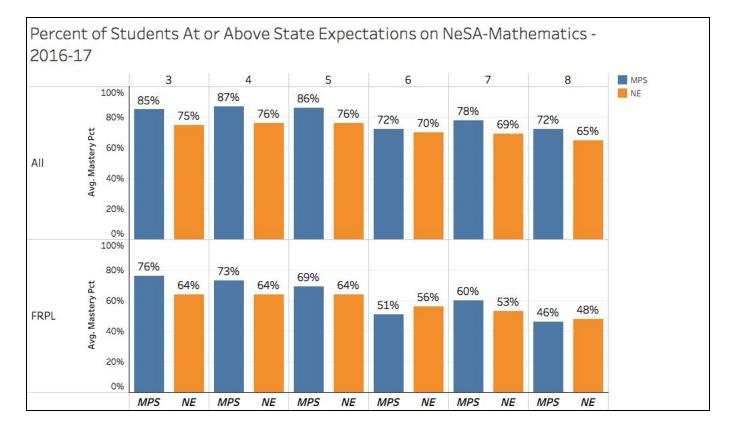
# **MATHEMATICS Results**

## NeSA - Mathematics -- 3rd - 8th Grades

The chart below displays the percent of poverty students at or above state mathematics expectations as compared to all students at both MPS and NE. The data source is the same as ELA -- NEP website.

Points to note from the 3rd-8th grades graph:

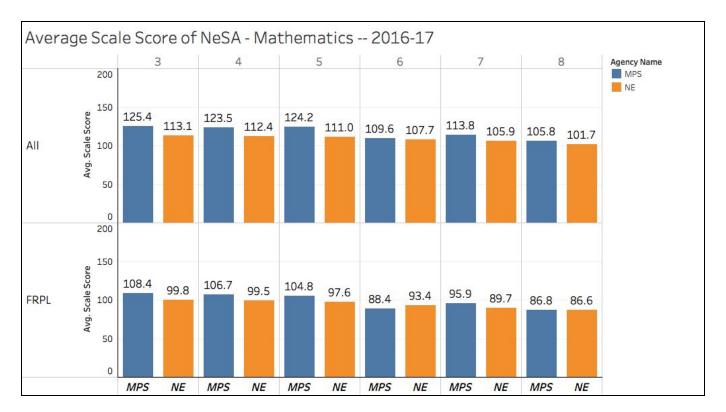
- The MPS all students group out achieved the NE group at all grade levels.
- The poverty students in MPS actually outperformed the NE all group at 3rd grade.
- The poverty students in MPS outperformed the NE group at the majority of grade levels. One would note at 6th and 8th grades the NE poverty students had a higher percentage than the comparable group at MPS.



The following chart compares the same groups of students but uses average scale score as the metric. The scale score ranges from 0 to 200. The cut point that is associated to meeting state expectations is 85 in all grade levels. The same scale score obtained on two consecutive test administrations represents one year's growth in one year's time. For example, a student scoring a 160 in grades 6 and 7, indicates that the student experienced one year's growth in one year's time. The general interpretation from the following chart is similar to the chart above.

Takeaways using the average scale score:

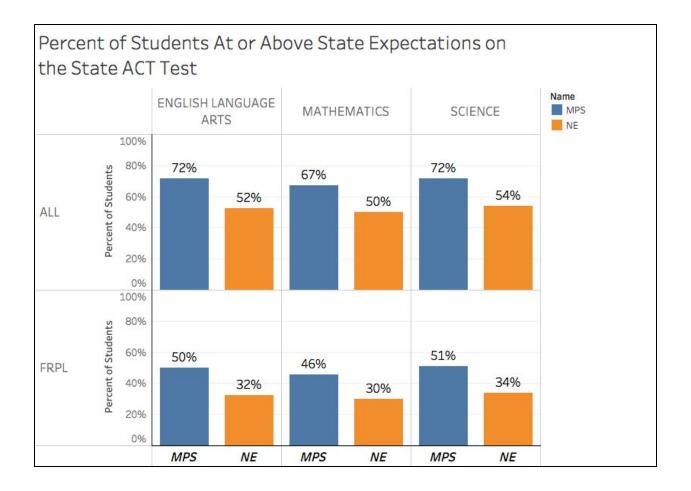
- MPS groups of students outperformed NE groups of students at almost all grade levels.
- All student groups for MPS and NE out performed the poverty student groups at all grade levels.
- NE poverty students had a higher average scale score at 6th grade than did MPS poverty students.



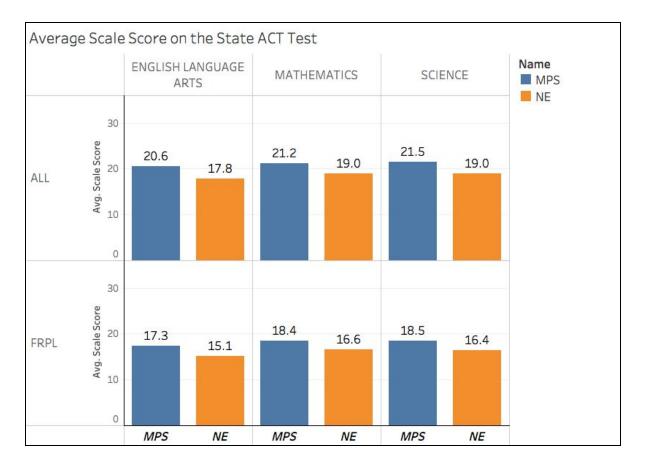
# High School Results

## ACT State Test -- English Language Arts, Mathematics, Science

The following ACT results are from the state test administration during the spring of a student's junior year. This information was obtained from the NEP website. The following chart compares students of poverty (FRPL) versus all students (ALL) within Millard Public Schools and across Nebraska in the subject areas of ELA, mathematics, and science. This chart indicates that all students meet or exceed state expectations at a higher percentage than the poverty students. All MPS students achieve higher than Nebraska students. Poverty students within the MPS district achieves at a higher rate than poverty students across the state. These characteristics are evident in all three subject areas.



Another approach to measuring achievement levels is to calculate the average scale score. These averages are included in chart that follows. The levels are similar when reviewing average scale scores as the percentages indicated in the previous chart -- MPS out achieves NE students -- when comparing similar groups of students -- All and Poverty.



#### **Retrospect: Previous Poverty Plan Reports Summary (2013-14 through 2015-16)**

The Poverty Plan Report designed in 2013 was created to support and enhance the school experience of students in poverty in Millard Public Schools. Although that purpose remains intact the data sets used for this annual report have changed. This 2016-17 Poverty Plan Report will reflect the transition Millard Public School's Assessment System is experiencing.

In retrospect the data provided through the lens of Kindergarten Cohorts has given Millard Public Schools a starting point for looking at how poverty affects Millard students in the areas of reading and mathematics. As we move forward MPS will be able to see how new data sources will increase our understanding of the impact of poverty on achievement with a fresh lens.

In respect to reading achievement from 2013-14 through 2015-16, the NeSA-Reading data generally showed increasing percentages of student at Meets and Exceeds Proficiency Levels thus reflecting a positive trend line toward higher scale scores. The gap between "All Students" and "Poverty" students was relatively constant. Although limited in scope, data from Millard Public Schools' district Text Level Reading Benchmark data indicated the majority of MPS students, "All Students and "Poverty" students, gained one or more years of growth from third grade to fourth grade and again from fourth grade to fifth grade for the populations studied.

The mathematics data provided by NeSA-Mathematics assessments for the Kindergarten Cohorts demonstrated little or no change in student scores over time resulting in little or no change in number of students at Meets or Exceeds Proficiency

Levels. There is evidence of the gap between "All Students" and "Poverty" students being widened when considering NeSA-M data. Millard Public Schools' district benchmark assessment for mathematics, Scholastic Mathematics Inventory (SMI), underwent significant changes in the summer of 2014 which caused data from the 2015-16 school year to be left out of that year's report. However, the data from the previous years may still provide some insight into mathematics skills of Millard Public School Students. Data from previous years for grades two through seven for both "All Students" and "Poverty" students show On-Level target scores for the winter administration of that benchmark assessment and consistently above the On-Level target scores provided by SMI for the spring administration of that assessment.

Millard Public Schools continues to support and enhance the school experience for students of poverty, while being aware much is yet to be done. As indicated by the data from 2013-14 through 2015-16, reading assessments provide positive results for MPS efforts to close the gap. However, in mathematics the results were not as clear or favorable.
